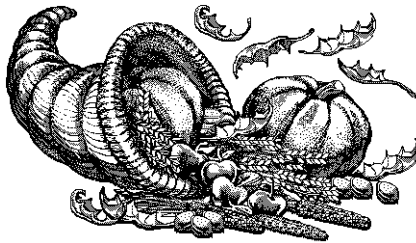

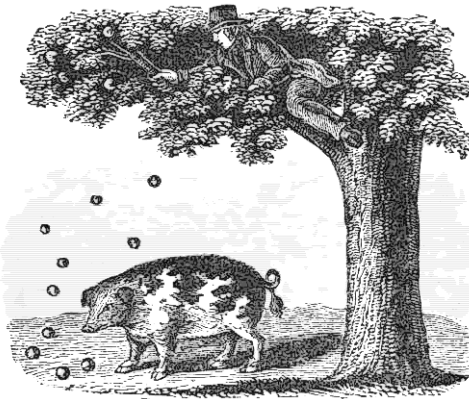

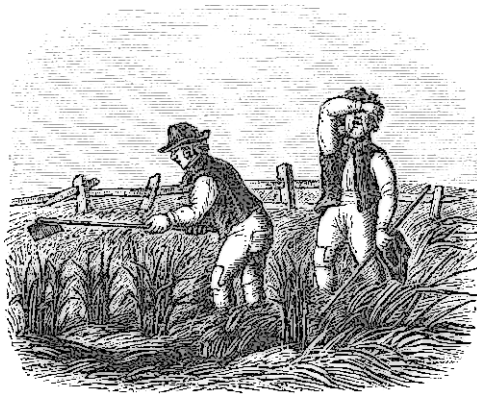

The feed stores listed on page 8 carry heat lamps, feeding and watering equipment, chick starter feed and grit. Some sell entire pre-fabricated chicken coops.
